So basically, your first two years, you're teaching a class and the district pays for your credential and you have like a mentor on campus. So basically, if I do it next year, I literally get a class right away. But only like thing is you have to be employed by that district for four years. After that, it's a year and I don't mind that. It's just that school district does not pay enough.

He basically, like, gets about 100,000 a year.
